OUR PROGRAMS



Strong Families is the gateway program that assists individuals with information and referrals on health, education, and legal issues. In 2022, it provided 2,023 direct services impacting 1,065 families, 7,118 household members, and 1,597 children under 19. Assisted 1,661 victims of crimes; provided 268 mental health counseling sessions to 82 constituents, trained 1,352 individuals from service providers about Language Access and Cultural Humility to other service providers.



The Citizenship and Immigration Program works to improve the lives of Hispanics new to Alabama by providing low-cost access to legal information and naturalization services with an authorized immigration representative. In 2022, CIP served 874 individuals (460 families) with various immigration services, including 59 naturalization applications, 38 U visa applications, 23 Green card applications, and 1 new and 45 renewal DACA applications. People from 39 counties in AL, 9 other states, and 26 countries benefited from these services.



The Empowering Communities Program (ECP) leads ¡HICA!'s college access and workforce development initiatives for Latino and other immigrants. In 2022, ECP supported 296 individuals, impacting 156 families and 234 children under 19. It also aided 64 high school students in college readiness, helped 25 students access \$307,825 through FAFSA, and awarded three \$1,500 scholarships. Moreover, ECP recruited 30+ Latinos for workforce training programs and assisted 22 immigrants in accessing good-paying jobs through the 'Re-work' program.



The Community Economic Development Program (CED) promotes financial stability and asset building, addressing limited access to financial products. In 2022, CED assisted 746 individuals, impacting 393 families and 589 children under 19. They filed 262 Taxes (\$686,643 refunded), offered 488 technical assistance sessions to aspiring entrepreneurs, resulting in 40 new businesses and 83 new jobs. CED-Housing counseled 102 first-time homebuyers and 241 participants, with 8 participants becoming homeowners.

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


